Salem School Proudly Presents Carols of Christmas






This contemporary song was written in 2000 by American songwriter Frank Hernandez.

Children's Hymn: Silent Night

Shortly after the Napoleonic Wars had taken their toll, lyric writer Joseph Mohr was inspired by how peaceful his little village seemed. He penned the lyrics and sang it along with the composer of the music, Franz Gruber, on Christmas Eve in 1816. It was originally written for guitar and voice, since the church organ was under repair.

The lyrics, based on Psalm 98, were crafted by Isaac Watts in 1719. He had no intention for it to be a Christmas carol since its contents sing about Christ's triumphant second coming rather than his first. The tune was created by George Frederic Handel in 1749 and can be heard in a chorus of his Messiah oratorio. This setting was composed by Lowell Mason in 1836.
