elcome! Thank you for joining us for worship today. In our services we gather before our almighty God to receive his gifts and to offer him our worship and praise. Through God's powerful Word and sacraments he renews our faith and strengthens us to serve in joy.

- **PRAYER BEFORE WORSHIP:** Savior Jesus, on this day when so many celebrate your birth, we give thanks that you have taught us what that birth means. Through your death we are free from death. By your life we have eternal life. Bless us every day in grace and mercy. Amen.
- **THEME OF THE DAY:** An antiphon is a selection of Scripture and prayer spoken or sung responsively by the minister and the congregation. The Great "O" Antiphons of Advent have been cherished for centuries by Christian worshipers. Each one consists of a title given to Christ in the Old Testament and a petition asking him to come and fulfill the Scriptural promise or prophecy. You can learn more about the structure of the "O" Antiphon service at the end of the bulletin.
- A WORD ABOUT HOLY COMMUNION: Our church observes the biblical practice of member communion (also called close communion). In Holy Communion we not only receive forgiveness from God, but we also express the unique relationship our members have with each other. If you are not a member of our congregation, we kindly ask that you not take communion today, but speak with our pastor after the service. We would love to share the sacrament with you in the future.
- **PASCHAL CANDLE** : The large candle next to the baptismal font symbolizes Christ, the Light of the World; Its large size symbolizes Jesus as the mighty Victor over death and sin. It is lit at every baptism, for *"we are buried with Him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life."* (Romans 6:4) It is kept burning throughout the Easter season and always lighted for Christian funerals to show the close connection between Christ's resurrection and the Christian's resurrection to life eternal.

M: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.



- M: Our Lord Jesus Christ invites us to come to him with penitent hearts, knowing that the sins of all who confess him as Savior are forgiven for all eternity. We rejoice in the One who told his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you." By his authority, hear his promise from the one he has called. Your sins are forgiven.
- M: Lord Jesus, you came to gather the nations into the peace of God's kingdom. Lord, have mercy.



M: You come in word and sacrament to strengthen us in holiness. Christ have mercy.



M: You will come in glory with salvation for your people. Lord, have mercy.



M: May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life. Amen.



Rite of Baptism

M: Our Savior Jesus Christ commanded Baptism when he said, *"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."*

All of us are born into this world with a deep need for Baptism. From our parents we inherit a sinful nature; we are without true fear of God and true faith in God and are condemned to eternal death. But while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. He took away our sin by giving his life on the cross. In Baptism, he clothes us with the robe of his righteousness and gives us a new life. We recall what Baptism means for our daily lives:

C: Baptism means that the sinful nature in us should be drowned by daily sorrow and repentance, and that all its evil deeds and desires be put to death. It also means that a new person should daily arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

The Rite of Baptism continues at the font.

M: The Gospel according to St. Mark: "People were bringing little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Truly I tell you, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." And he took the children in his arms, placed his hands on them and blessed them."

The minister applies water to the person presented for baptism as he says in turn:

M: Cooper David Frederick Ous / Alayna Verelle Ous, I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Receive the sign of the cross on the head and heart + to mark you as one redeemed by Christ the crucified.

The almighty God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ has given you the new birth of water and the Spirit and has forgiven all your sins. May he strengthen you with his grace all the days of your life. Peace be with you.

Exhortation to Parents & Congregation

M: Brothers and sisters in Christ:

Our Lord commands that we teach his precious truths to all who are baptized. Christian love therefore urges all of us, especially parents and sponsors, to assist in whatever manner possible so that Cooper and Alayna and all the children of our church may remain children of God until death. If you are willing to carry out this responsibility, then answer: Yes, as God gives me strength.

C: Yes, as God gives me strength.

M: Let us pray.

We give thanks, most merciful Father, that you have received Cooper and Alayna as your own children and made them members of Christ's body, the church. Now, we pray, grant to them and to all your church on earth that, being dead to sin, we may live to righteousness and, being buried with Christ into his death, we may also share in his resurrection, so that, with all your saints, we may inherit eternal life; through Christ our Lord.

C: Amen.

The Great "O" Antiphons

After each section of Scripture is read, the congregation responds with a hymn verse of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" followed by a prayer and responsive Amen. With this "Amen" worshipers show their trust in Christ's promise to come to us.



O Sapientia (Wisdom)

Isaiah 11:2

"The Spirit of the LORD will rest on him—the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of might, the Spirit of the knowledge and fear of the LORD."

Hymn: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

- Oh, come, O, Wisdom from on high, who orders all things mightily; To us the path of knowledge show, and teach us in her ways to go. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.
- M: O Wisdom, springing from the mouth of the most High, pervading and permeating all creation, mightily order all things; come and teach us the way of prudence.

O Clavis David (Key of David)

Isaiah 22:22

"I will place on his shoulder the key to the house of David; what he opens no one can shut, and what he shuts, no one can open."

- Oh, come, O Key of David, come and open wide our heavenly home.
 Make safe the way that leads on high, and close the path to misery.
 Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.
- M: O Key of David and scepter of the house of Israel, you open and no one can close; you close and no one can open; come and rescue the prisoners who are in the darkness and shadow of death.
- C: Amen.



Isaiah 9:2

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light. For those living in the land of the shadow of death, the light has dawned."

- Oh, come, O Dayspring from on high, and cheer us by your drawing nigh;
 Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight.
 Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.
- M: O Dayspring, splendor of light everlasting, come and enlighten those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.
- C: Amen.



O Rex Gentium (King of Nations)

Isaiah 9:6-7

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever."

- Oh, come, O King of nations, bind in one the hearts of all mankind; Oh, bid our sad divisions cease, and be yourself the King of Peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.
- M: O King of the nations, the ruler they long for, the cornerstone for uniting all people, come and save the human race, whom you formed out of clay.
- C: Amen.



Isaiah 7:14

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel."

- Oh, come, oh, come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel That mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel!
- M: O Emmanuel, our King and our Lord, the anointed of the nations and their Savior, come and save us, O Lord our God.
- C: Amen.

Therefore, we invite to communion all those who share in our confession by virtue of their membership here or in a sister WELS or ELS congregation. We ask visitors to speak to the pastor before communing.

Words of Institution

M: Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my + body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; this is my + blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

- M: The peace of the Lord be with you always.
- C: Amen.



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The Great "O" Antiphons

Each of the "O Antiphons" focuses on a title of Christ from Old Testament prophecy and a petition to Christ to come fulfilling the promise made by that title and prophecy. The Messianic prophecies in Isaiah form the heart of the seven antiphons. Historically, the O Antiphons were sung during Vespers, one each day, seven days before the festival of the Nativity of Christ, from December 17 through December 23.

The "O Antiphons" date back at least to around 800 A.D. (and perhaps back as early as 500 A.D.) By the later Middle Ages, the antiphons had been put together to form the verses of a single hymn, with the addition of a refrain. The earliest known metrical and rhymed form of the O Antiphons—essentially the hymn we know to-day as "O come, O come, Emmanuel"—did not appear until the early 18th century. It was translated from Latin into English by John Mason Neal, an Anglican (Church of England) minister in 1851. It was paired with the 15th-century tune now known as *Veni Emmanuel*.

The traditional order of the seven antiphons is:

- (1) Sapientia: "O Wisdom"
- (2) Adonai: "O Lord of Might"
- (3) Radix Jesse: "O Root of Jesse"
- (4) Clavis David: "O Key of David"
- (5) Oriens: "O Dayspring"
- (6) Rex Gentium: "O King of Nations"
- (7) Emmanuel: "O Emmanuel"

In Latin, the first letter of each antiphon, read in reverse spells "ero cras", which means "Tomorrow I will be" or "Tomorrow I will become."

The basic progression of thought can be understood this way: The creator of the Universe (Wisdom), who gave the Law (Adonai) was promised through David's throne (Radix Jesse) to set free the captives of sin (Clavis David) and bring the Light of salvation to dawn (Oriens) not only on His chosen people but all nations (Rex Gentium) and dwell with us as one of us eternally (Emmanuel).

The basic petition through all the verses is an echo of the closing two verses of the Holy Scriptures looking forward to the consummation of all things: *"He who testifies to these things says, 'Yes, I am coming soon.' Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with God's people. Amen."* (Revelation 22:20-21)

PERSONAL PREPARATION FOR HOLY COMMUNION

(Also printed in the hymnal)

- Q: What does God tell me about myself in his holy Word?
- *A*: He says that I am a sinner and deserve only his punishment.
- Q: What should I do if I am not aware of my sins or am not troubled by them?
- A: I should examine myself according to the Ten Commandments and ask how well I have carried out my responsibilities as a husband or wife or single person, as a parent or child, an employer or employee, a teacher or student. Have I loved God with all my heart, gladly heard his Word, and patiently endured affliction? Have I been disobedient, proud, or unforgiving? Have I been selfish, lazy, envious, or quarrelsome? Have I lied or deceived, taken something not mine, or given anyone a bad name? Have I abused my body or permitted indecent thoughts to linger in my mind? Have I failed to do what is right and good?
- Q: When I realize that I have sinned against God and deserve his punishment, what should I do?
- *A*: *I* will confess before God all my sins, those which I remember as well as those of which I am unaware. I will pray to God for his mercy and forgiveness.
- Q: How do I receive his gracious forgiveness?
- *A*: His Word assures me that Jesus led a pure and holy life for me and died on the cross for me to pay the full price for all my sins. Through faith in Jesus, I have been clothed in my Savior's perfect righteousness and holiness.
- Q: What further assurance do I have that Jesus is mine and I am his?
- A: In Holy Communion he gives me his body and blood together with the bread and wine as a truly life-giving food and drink to unite me with him and my fellow believers. By means of this sacrament, Jesus not only forgives my sins but sweeps away all my doubts about his love for me, gives me his own strength to live a God-pleasing life, and grants me a joyful foretaste of heaven.
- Q: How can I be sure that I receive all these blessings in the Lord's Supper?
- A: I have his own word spoken as his last will and testament on the night before he died. There he tells me: "Take and eat; this is my body. Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this in remembrance of me."
- Q: How will I respond to this priceless gift from Jesus?
- *A*: I will daily thank and praise him for his love to me. With his help I will fight temptation, do my best to correct whatever wrongs I have done, and serve him and those around me with love and good works.

Lord Jesus, with joy and gratitude I now come to your table to receive the precious food of your life-giving body and blood. May it strengthen me to remain in you as you remain in me, so that I bear much fruit in devoted service to you and in acts of kindness to others. Amen.
