- SERIES THEME: Our midweek Lent series theme is *God on Trial*. The unbelieving world has always insisted on putting God on trial. As our society becomes more secular, we Christians are increasingly aware of the many ways in which God—and his people—are judged. Temptations are many in this environment: treating unbelievers as enemies, retreating from the world, even questioning God ourselves. How do we live as people of God in this hostile world? We find our model—and our motivation—in Jesus. This series takes us back to the moments when God was literally on trial before men in the person of Christ. In these inspired episodes, we find forgiveness for us and all people, love for our enemies, strength for our faith, and courage to testify to the truth.
- **TONIGHT'S FOCUS:** Whether Pilate's tone was sincere or sneering, he expressed what may be the most important question of his day and ours: *What is truth?* We can be tempted to question God's truth, especially with the uncertainty of everything around us. However, God has given us truth in a person: his only Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus stood before Pilate as a real flesh and blood person. He gave his real life as a payment for sin, and his empty tomb is proof of God's truth that life overcomes death!

Tonight we welcome Pastor Bob Beaver as our guest preacher. Pastor Beaver serves our sister church, Salem Lutheran, in Woodbury.



THE PASSION HISTORY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST

"The Scripture readings used in these midweek services are called the Passion History. Unlike the ordinary meaning of the word passion, the meaning of this word as it applies to the series of readings during Lent is based on the original Latin and Greek. Passio (Latin) and pascha (Greek) speak of suffering as reflected in our contemporary word compassion ("suffering with someone"). So we read a history of the suffering and death of our Savior. The readings each week are a composite, sequential account taken from all four gospels. They provide us with the complete story of the suffering and death of our Lord."

Part #1— Gethsemane

PASTOR: Jesus told his disciples, "This very night you will all fall away on account of me, for it is written: 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.' But after I have risen, I will go ahead of you into Galilee." Peter replied,

CONGREGATION: "Even if all fall away on account of you, I never will."

PASTOR: Jesus answered, "I tell you the truth, this very night before the rooster crows you will disown me three times." But Peter insisted emphatically,

CONGREGATION: "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you."

PASTOR: And all the others said the same. Then Jesus went with his disciples and crossed the Kidron Valley. On the other side there was an olive grove, a place called Gethsemane. Jesus and his disciples went into it. Now Judas, who betrayed him, knew the place, because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. On reaching the place, Jesus said to his disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray. Pray that you will not fall into temptation."

He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, James and John, along with him and began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me." Jesus withdrew about a stone's throw, knelt down, and fell on the ground and prayed that if possible the hour might pass from him. He said,

<u>CONGREGATION</u>: "Father, everything is possible for you. If you are willing, take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will. Not my will, but yours be done."

PASTOR: An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him. And being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground.

When he rose from prayer and went back to the disciples, he found them asleep, exhausted from sorrow. He said to Peter, "Simon, are you asleep? Could you men not keep watch with me for one hour? Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the body is weak." He went away a second time and prayed,

<u>CONGREGATION</u>: "My Father, if it is not possible for this cup to be taken away unless I drink it, may your will be done."

PASTOR: When he came back, he again found them sleeping, because their eyes were heavy. They did not know what to say to him. So he left them and went away once more and prayed the third time, saying the same thing. Returning to the disciples the third time, he said to them, "Are you still sleeping and resting? Look, the hour is near, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise, let us go! Here comes my betrayer!"

While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived, guiding a detachment of soldiers and some officials from the chief priests and Pharisees. They were carrying torches, lanterns, and weapons.

Now the betrayer had arranged a signal with them: "The one I kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." Going at once to Jesus, Judas approached Jesus to kiss him and said, "Greetings, Rabbi!" and kissed him. Jesus asked him,

<u>CONGREGATION</u>: "Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss? Friend, do what you came for."

PASTOR: Jesus, knowing all that was going to happen to him, went out and asked them, "Who is it you want?" They replied,

CONGREGATION: "Jesus of Nazareth!"

PASTOR: "I am he," Jesus said. Judas the traitor was standing there with them. When Jesus said, "I am he," they drew back and fell to the ground. Again he asked them, "Who is it you want?"

CONGREGATION: "Jesus of Nazareth!"

PASTOR: Jesus answered, "I told you that I am he. If you are looking for me, then let these men go."

<u>CONGREGATION</u>: This happened so that the words he had spoken would be fulfilled: "I have not lost one of those you gave me.

PASTOR: Then the men stepped forward, seized Jesus and arrested him. When Jesus' followers saw what was going to happen, they said,

CONGREGATION: "Lord, should we strike with our swords?"

PASTOR: One of Jesus' companions, Simon Peter, reached for his sword, drew it out and struck the servant of the high priest, cutting off his right ear. The servant's name was Malchus.

Jesus said to Peter, "No more of this! Put your sword back into its sheath, for all who draw the sword will die by the sword. Shall I not drink the cup the Father has given me? Do you think I cannot call on my Father, and he will at once put at my disposal more than twelve legions of angels? But how, then, would the Scriptures be fulfilled that say it must happen in this way?"

CONGREGATION: And he touched the man's ear and healed him.

PASTOR: Jesus said to the crowd, "Am I leading a rebellion, that you have come out with swords and clubs to capture me? Every day I sat in the temple courts teaching, and you did not lay a hand on me. But this is your hour - when darkness reigns! This has all taken place that the writings of the prophets might be fulfilled."

<u>CONGREGATION</u>: Then seizing him, they led him away and took him into the house of the high priest.


PASTOR: All the disciples deserted him and fled. A young man, wearing nothing but a linen garment, was following Jesus. When they seized him, he fled naked, leaving his garment behind.




